

Notes from Our Past

Alberton Church was established in 1846. As the community name Alberton had not yet come into use, the congregation was called Ancaster West.

In 1854 Alberton was linked with Ancaster East (now known as Carluke) and St. Andrew's Church in the village of Ancaster.

A year later, the Rev. John Lees was the first ordained minister called to serve this joint pastoral charge.

The first meeting place for the Alberton congregation was a simple log building. This was replaced by a frame building in about 1860 and the present brick building was erected in 1878.

For almost its entire history Alberton Church was linked with neighbouring Presbyterian congregations in order to support a minister. For most of that time Alberton was paired with St. Andrew's Church in Ancaster.

However, for the past 15 years Alberton has been on its own and leadership has been provided by Ministers who serve on a part-time basis.

The present Minister, the Rev. Dr. Robert Bernhardt, has served Alberton since 2008.

The Alberton building has been enlarged twice. The brick sanctuary, built in 1878, was enhanced in 1910 with a small addition to provide classrooms for Sunday School. Then in 1964 a larger addition that included a kitchen and a church hall was added.

In 2010 the church hall was named Johnston Hall as a memorial to the Rev. Dr. John A. Johnston who served Alberton prior to his death in 2008.

Alberton Church is situated in a tranquil country setting that is right on the edge of the city of Hamilton.

Alberton Church is only a 20 minute drive (via the Linc and the 403) from almost anyplace on the Mountain or in the west end of the city of Hamilton.
